Subject: Radio Marker

RADIO MARKER PROCEDURE

The radio marker is a half-second tone burst every 10 seconds. The marker will be used at the discretion of the dispatcher on duty, based upon the following situations:

- A. "In pursuit" (use the phrase with care) the marker will be taken down upon hearing the situation is "under control".
- B. "Shots being fired", When stated by *an officer on scene*. The marker will be taken down upon hearing the situation is "under control".
- C. Officer down.
- D. Any special requests for the marker to be utilized will be honored. The marker is to be taken down as soon as the situation has stabilized.
- E. To assure that the marker function is effectively used, all must adhere to the following:
 - 1. *Always* listen to your radio at least 10 seconds before transmitting. (Life threatening transmissions the exception).
 - 2. While the marker is on, no non-emergency traffic will be given. Officers should monitor the frequency and update the Communications Center on status changes after the marker is down.
 - 3. While the marker is on *do not* ask what is going on and where. If you are needed but have been out of radio contact, the Communications Center will continue trying to reach you.
 - 4. **Do not** call the Communications Center by telephone while an incident is on going for information if it does not involve your department.
 - 5. If an officer or department that is requested for assistance cannot be reached, the next closest officer or department will be contacted for assistance.
- F. When the marker is needed the dispatcher will announce "Clearfield County marker up". When the incident is under control the dispatcher will announce "Clearfield County marker down".
